### Message From Our Director - Kurt Nordness

VERY GOOD AND GETTING BETTER – A continuous commitment to improve our international school is our goal. We aspire to be a school where students get the best education possible and families have their needs met. We take this goal seriously. To achieve the goal we have taken three significant steps.

The first was inviting three highly-respected accreditation agencies to examine us thoroughly. As you may know, in the spring of 2011, examiners from around the world spent several weeks studying our school records and procedures. These examiners then traveled to DAIS and spent a week speaking with parents, students, and teachers. We were gratified when each of these three agencies granted us full accreditation. These agencies were the Council of International Schools from Europe, the Western Association of Colleges and Schools from the United States, and the National Center for Curriculum and Textbook Development here in China.

The second step toward improving our school has been underway since last school year. It is the process we call strategic planning. In December 2011, Mr. Harlan Lyso—a noted international school consultant and former head of school—facilitated five days of meetings to decide steps to make our school better. The first objective of this "visionary" exercise was to create a single school-wide guiding plan/document that would serve as the school's road-map to a improved future. We examined our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats, and then created eleven initiatives meant to help the school improve. The first four initiatives that we have worked on this year are curriculum; school-wide learning goals; the program for English language learners, and teacher training and growth. Great progress has been made in each area. Next year we will work to improve two additional areas of the school.

A third way we try to get better is by asking our parents, students, and teachers what we need to improve. We have been doing this through a survey every year. The survey asks our community their opinion about the quality of education, safety, and other programs. We even ask for level of satisfaction about bus service and school lunch. As a result of suggestions from last year's survey, the school did a major re-modeling of the elementary cafeteria so the food could be served more efficiently and that it stayed hot throughout the entire lunch period. We have seen a significant rise in the number of students who eat school lunch, thanks to these changes. This is but one example of many improvements the school has made this year as a result of community feedback.

Dalian American International School is a very good school. With the help of our accreditation agencies, our ongoing improvement plans, and regular feedback from our community, we can become a great school. Thank you to all--parents, students, and teachers--who are helping DAIS improve.


# INTRODUCING THE DAIS NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

The Golden Pebble Chapter of the National Honor Society is coming to DAIS! The National Honor Society (NHS) recognizes outstanding high school students who have demonstrated excellence in the areas of "Scholarship, Leadership, Service, and Character." Founded in the United States in 1921, NHS has grown into an international organization of more than one million students, whose members are recognized by colleges as students of high merit.

Students are nominated for NHS based upon their academic achievement, having earned a minimum GPA of 3.9. After nomination, students wishing to become members submit a candidate form to a faculty council who determines selection based upon a rigorous set of criteria. Besides the minimum GPA, criteria for selection includes at least 15 hours of community service, documented leadership experience, teacher evaluations and demonstration of character through the school's core values of Respect, Responsibility and Integrity.

The successful candidates will join an elite organization that engages in service to both the local and global community. The Golden Pebble Chapter will conduct group and individual service projects that will benefit both DAIS and the Jinshitan community. Our inaugural induction ceremony will be held here at DAIS in September of 2013. This is an exciting "first" for our school that recognizes student academic achievement, service, leadership and strength of character—and is appropriately aligned with the DAIS mission of achieving "personal excellence" and contributing "to the global community."
